Administration Report of Malta UNESCO Youth Association

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Introduction

Another active year for MUYA has led to another AGM, and this year has seen ample activities for committee & active members, especially in the spectrum of participation in international projects.

Throughout the years 2018/2019 MUYA focused more on instilling a closer relationship with other established UNESCO bodies also operating in Malta. A series of meetings both regulatory and informative were also at the heart of this year's priorities.

On the international level, MUYA has flourished throughout this year since partnering in double the amount of Erasmus+ projects being offered when compared to previous years. In total, MUYA sent of 48 of its members to 13 different activities (these included youth exchanges, training courses and advanced planning visits). Due to the increased amount of international projects, resources were mainly focused on the recruiting and preparing participants aspect.

MUYA's most significant project for this year - "Game Zone: Developing an inclusive society through games" - was supported by the international funding opportunity Erasmus+ funding body. 30 young people were hosted in Dingli Youth Activity Centre for 8 days.

1. National projects and local activities

1.1 – Annual General Meeting

12th March 2018

Our annual AGM in 2018 was held at Kunsill Nazzjonali taz-Zghazagh premises in Floriana with the appointed Chairperson Ms Sarah Suda. During the AGM the Secretary General Thelma Bonello gave an overview of the activities and projects which Malta UNESCO Youth Association participated throughout the year 2017 to the date of the AGM: National projects, International projects local and overseas and future projects. Following this, Reece Delia presented the financial report on behalf of the Treasurer Bernard Bonello in his absence. During this AGM, Ms Rodianne Cassar, Ms Maxine Bellissimo, Mr Fabio Scicluna and Mr Christain Briffa were re-confirmed in their roles of President, International Officer, Public Relations Officer and Committee Member respectively for the upcoming two years. Since members were reconfirmed no voting procedures as per Statute were necessary. No changes to the statute were made for the year 2018 and thus, the previous Statute was reconfirmed. At the end of the AGM, Mr Anson Aquilina and Ms Christianne Caruana were confirmed on the Board of Vigilance for the coming year.

1.2 – The President's Secret Garden

24th May 2018

This Year the President's Secret Garden organized by The President's Foundation for the Wellbeing of Society (PFWS) was aimed towards older children. The core aim of the project was to create the space to give children and young people the opportunity to feel empowered and learn to be active citizens and agents of change in their own communities and nations, supported and encouraged by the adults around them. The thematic chosen for this year by the organization was "Peace Building" whereby older children are exposed to people who are making an active contribution towards peace building in the Maltese community. The main question being answering the question: 'what can one do to be better Peace builders in our communities/schools?' The proposed agenda for a couple of hours on the 24th May envisaged workshops with politicians, heroes and NGOs who contribute to the wellbeing of our society through experience sharing with these people. After the discussion the older children were to share learnt messages through drawing, writing, recording of video messages and other mediums. Rodianne Cassar and Thelma Bonello attended this event after preparing some activities, however, due to some unexpected turn of events, the schools which were to attend on the day cancelled their participation. Following this communication by PFWS, the rest of the event was aimed at networking amongst the present NGOs.

1.3 – Erasmus+ EUPA Grant Award Ceremony

26th July 2018

The European Union Programmes Agency (EUPA) organized an event to distribute its grants for the second deadline of KA1 – Learning Mobility of Individuals where MUYA was granted the funds for Erasmus+ Training Course "Game Zone". The event was organized in Egmont Hall, Fort St Angelo Birgu where awardees were invited for a small reception in the same venue to also commemorate the 31 years of the Erasmus+ funding programmes. The President and Secretary General attended this event on behalf of the rest of the committee.

1.4 – Invitation from the President of Malta - Reception

7th August 2018

On Tuesday 7th August 2018 MUYA was invited by Her Excellency Marie-Louise Coleiro Preca, President of Malta for a reception at San Anton Palace together with various other student organisations such as KSU (Kunsill Studenti Universitarji) and KSJC (Kunsill Studenti Junior College). Her Excellency The President extended her cordialities by providing an extended tour of San Anton Palace (explaining the different rooms and their different purposes). The event was commemorated by a small memorabilia gifted on the day. Rodianne Cassar, Christian Briffa and Thelma Bonello attended this event.

2. International projects Implemented by MUYA

2.1 – E+ Training Course: Game Zone

27th September – 4th October 2018

"Game Zone: Developing an inclusive society through games" was organized by the Malta UNESCO Youth Association at the Dingli Youth Activity Centre, Malta (6 working days and 2 travel days) following the guidelines for 2018 of Key Action 1 - Learning Mobility of Individuals, Erasmus+ programme of the European Commission. Supported by trainers and support staff from both Estonia and Malta this project included 30 youth workers and youth leaders from 9 countries including Malta, Estonia, Czech Republic, Slovenia, Germany, Poland, Kosovo, Ukraine and Lithuania. The current situation in Europe is deterring in relation to migration waves, long-lasting youth unemployment, economic struggle, terror attacks, media and geo-political speculation and is in turn generating anti-European views. The latter is in turn generating more heated debates and concerns in society which are leading for prejudice to prosper. This training course aimed to give youth workers & youth leaders tools, frameworks and space to create and practice facilitation of educational games that address social issues and can be applied in their environments. During the training course, participants had the opportunity to explore entrepreneurship through multimedia presentations, interviews, plenary discussions, open space technology, creative workshops, role plays, active selling simulation exercises, presentations of good practices and more. By the end of the training course, each participant group created their own thematic game exploring social issues and finally, and in order to present their educational games, a [booklet](#) was created by the participants themselves targeting other youth workers and youth looking for inspiration on how to implement educational games tackling current social topics.



3. Participation in international projects abroad

3.1 – E+ Youth Exchange: Stories to share

Csesznek, Hungary, 24th March – 30th March 2018

Malta UNESCO Youth Association was a participating organisation in an Erasmus+ Youth Exchange Youth Exchange called "Stories to Share" which took place in Csesznek, Hungary from the 24th to the 30th of March 2018. Youth from 7 countries (Bulgaria, Estonia, Hungary, Italy, Malta, Serbia and Spain) joined forces in a project which dealt with the topic of social sensitization using the method of storytelling. The participants took part in plenty of different workshops. One of the main touching workshops for the Maltese participants included a scenario in which every participant had to place himself in the role of a predefined character (for example, an orphan living on the streets) and act accordingly to the opportunities presented to them. In another workshop, participants were split in different groups to create promotional videos about social inclusion. Participants were also asked to split in groups by country, to share the current situation regarding social inclusion (especially immigration for the Maltese). The Maltese participants of MUYA have shared their views about the current situation of illegal immigrants coming from Africa and the conflicts generated with other European nations. Participants also went to a local school in Gyor, where they met local Hungarian students with different levels of English and managed to surpass the language barrier between them. Teambuilding activities were not lacking either, with a day activity in the nearby city of Gyor, a hike on a "via ferrata", cultural dances presented by the Hungarian team and also an intercultural evening.

3.2 – E+ Training Course: FYI- Finding your Inspiration

The second international project for MUYA was "Finding Your Inspiration" which took place in Pragelato Turin which saw the participation of two Maltese participants. Trainers and Youth Workers from 12 countries (Greece, Hungary, Cyprus, Latvia, Romania, Malta, Slovakia, The Netherlands, Portugal, Ireland, UK and Italy) came together to participate in a training aimed at aiding professionals in finding their element, passions and dreams and in return learn how to aid youths in finding their own passions and dreams. In the words of John Paul Formosa, one of the participants, the training was full of powerful activities, tools and techniques that were used to provide reflection for the trainers themselves and were useful to equip participants with powerful tools that can be replicated in their own societal setting. The training course also provided the unique opportunity for trainers to share their own tools and knowledge. One of the Maltese participants was able to share the tool 'Abigail's tale' from SaltoYouth with the rest of the participants. John Paul continued to say "it was a great opportunity and cause for reflection on how different countries and people approach situations differently based on cultural traditions and social norm". All in all, it was a great experience for the Maltese participants in providing tools and training to other professionals. Participants were also asked to partake in a 'Skills market' activity where they had to value their own skills and buy, sell or trade them with skills from other participants. This activity was an eye-opener to how often people and youths undervalue their own skills and it provided great experience for the MUYA participants to help youths build their confidence and self-esteem. The training course was a powerful experience for both Maltese participants and provided adequate training, knowledge sharing and presentations about different cultural traditions, an intercultural market and many more effective tools.

3.3 – E+ Youth Exchange: You-th & Heal-th

Organised by Youth for the World

The project "You-th & Hea-lth" took place in Georgia in April 2018. Ms Farrugia and Ms Vella participated on behalf of MUYA. The project stemmed from youth leaders involved in healthy & conscious decision-making lifestyle spectrums that wanted to create a project that targets how consumerism is taking a significant portion of daily life. The main aim of this topic was to give a reflection toolbox to participants to be able to make more conscious decisions. The objectives of this YE were to challenge the perceptions of capitalism cultures; to overcome stereotypes of eating habits of vegans, vegetarians and meat eaters; to learn how to grow own food; to learn how to select food from the nature; and to encourage a healthy nutrition. The project promoted the ideology that healthy soul exists only in the healthy body and following this, daily physical activities were organized. Other activities included learning how to work and live in the garden and in the nature.

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3.4 – E+ Youth Exchange: LEADER – European connections for rural development

This youth exchange was a learning experience about the Rural Way of Life and a think tank program on methods to attract youths to move back into the rural areas. 30 participants participated from Portugal, Malta, Bulgaria, Poland, Lithuania and Slovakia. The scope of the activities was to discuss and come up with ideas on how youths can adapt ways and means to earn a living if they move into the rural areas. A visit into the mountain region of Viseu exposed the participants to a small hamlet. In this hamlet the local community voluntarily had embellished the area of the river where they cleaned and turfed the river bank and built huts as for people to change into. Adrian Bugeja Douglas explained how this is attracting visitors to the area with the benefit of selling local produce and using the local bar and restaurant. The workshops were centred around this concept and various ideas were presented as participants were splits in six groups to come up with a working suggestion to attract people into the rural areas. Each country also had to build a model from paper and carton to demonstrate a project to aid the rural area and the environment. The Maltese group successfully built a model of a bee hotel to increase the number of bees in the locality. This model attracted the attention of the local mayor who asked if this can be adopted by the local school to build the bee hotels and place them in the local environment.

3.5 – E+ Youth Exchange: Mind Your Body

The Youth Exchange Mind Your Body was a project based on healthy habits for youth through exercise and healthy food. The leaders and one representative of the group had a preparatory meeting prior to the youth exchange, during two days the leaders of the sending organizations went to Trbovlje, Slovenia to plan the following agenda for around 20 participants from Malta, Portugal, Greece and Slovenia. This preparatory meeting made everybody really excited to meet each other and start living the agenda. In the words of the participants, there were 3 main goals in this project:- (i) to create a magazine with at least 2 vegetarian easy recipes one can cook in less than 20 minutes (ii) to create a video with simple physical exercises and (iii) to do a vegetables festival (VEGE-FESTIVAL) whereby the local community was invited to share the experience of the participants. Prior to the Youth Exchange, the Maltese team started preparing recipes to share and a presentation about Malta. At the end of the exchange program everybody was part of the team, and the group itself felt like family. Participants enriched their knowledge about vegan life style, fun ways to do training, vegetarian recipes, video making and time management. Due to the weather some changes were made by the organizers:- the Treasure hunt and the horse riding activities were replaced with other activities like swimming and yoga. The Maltese group was always proactive, energetic and being exemplary to the rest of the group.

3.6 – E+ Youth Exchange: Unity through creativity

Malta UNESCO Youth Association was a participating organisation in the 4th edition of Creativity Youth Exchange called "Unity through Creativity". The project took place over 10 days, grouping 63 young people (aged below 18) from 9 countries:- Malta, UK, Hungary, Italy, Latvia, Portugal, Greece, Romania and Slovakia. The project explored the idea and concepts of unity and social inclusion through different forms of arts; music, drama, arts and crafts, photography, dance and fashion. The participants took part in the mentioned workshops with the aim to deliver a final showcase for the local community. During their preparation participants were constantly faced with challenges set by the host organisation to promote teamwork amongst the members and integration from all 9 countries. One of the motives included the splitting up of members into 4 tribes; air, fire, wind and earth. A competitive ambience was instigated between the tribes, (once again by the host organisation as part of their programme) turning all 4 different groups against each other. Towards the end of the exchange the rivalry ended by a consensus between the team leaders, and a peace offering was presented to the residence of the hosting location through the the plantation of a plant in its gardens. This is an exceptional project in which MU YA is giving the opportunity for teens below the age of 18 to participate in such projects.

3.7 – E+ Youth Exchange: 4Equality

During September, another YE took place over 7 days involving 32 young people aged between 18 – 21 from 5 different countries:- Greece, Cyprus, Italy, Malta, Portugal. This Youth Exchange was organized by the Association for Family Planning, Alentejo in Portugal and in total, six participants participated on behalf of MUYA. The topic of the exchange was gender equality and the importance of providing men and women the same opportunities and access to education, healthcare, work distribution, participation, decision-making and security. The project encouraged reflection about the challenges and solutions for gender inequalities in each country represented and identified good practices on raising awareness on this topic by finding ideas, suggestions and alternatives for contributing to the building of a more equalitarian status in each respective country. This exchange served to promote the capacities of the young people involved in greater awareness in replicating, improving and creating tools, which will enable and motivate other young people in their countries of origin in the topic of gender equality.

3.8 – E+ Training Course: Wings of youth work

Organised by Mladinski center Trbovlje

Trbovlje, Slovenia, 11th November – 17th November 2018

In the month of November, the first segment (out of three) of the project “Wings of youth work” took place between participating countries from Italy, Portugal, Croatia, Malta, Greece, Denmark, Norway. This first segment of the project was meant for youth workers and/or youth leaders and volunteers who are in daily contact with youth and which would like to develop their knowledge, experience and competences. The main goal of the course was to teach participants the methods of developing a training system for an organisation that resonate with its goals and needs. This was achieved through guidance from trainers giving the opportunity to the participants to use their knowledge in a creative way. According to one of the Maltese participants, one thing which she enjoyed most during the training course was the opportunity to listen to ideas and perspectives of others. Even though participants were all like-minded and open-minded people, each one had unique viewpoints, influenced from the individual experiences, cultures and lifestyles belonging to each participant. All participants managed to interact with each other, share ideas, develop relationships and work together as one. One strong learning point for the Maltese team was learning that for successful teamwork acceptance of the diverse characteristics of each participants is key. Overall Justine and Lynn commented that the training course managed to reach its goals and objectives satisfying both of their expectation.

3.9 – E+ Training Course: Game Time: education through game practices

In the last weeks of November, Malta UNESCO Youth Association was a participating organisation in an Erasmus+ Training Course Youth Exchange called "Game Time: Education through game practices" which took place in Essen, Germany from the 17th to the 24th of March 2018. Youth from 10 countries (Germany, Estonia, Bulgaria, Czech Republic, Romania, Greece, Poland, Malta, Spain and Italy) joined forces in a project which dealt with the topic of creating new educational games to be used when working with youths. These games, through their creation and actualization, would target specific social issues such as propaganda, communication and migration, which were the topics of choice by the Maltese participants. In the words of Mariano Galea, after participating in a game themselves, participants were then given the right tools and mentoring to create their own game in different groups. This was followed by a debriefing session, after which feedback was sought from the trainers as well as the participants. The group easily bonded even on the first night, and during free time you could also find many of the participants playing other games just for fun. According to Mariano, the strong point of training course was the group having a lot in common, especially when it comes to the passion they had for creating games. This is ultimately what made the group bond so quickly and easily and which set the bases for an excellent project.

3.10 – E+ Training Course: Really Including Inclusion

The third international project for November which took place in the United Kingdom involved the participation of two Maltese participants on behalf of MU YA. The 7 day project was between Bulgaria, Croatia, Czech Republic, Estonia, Greece, Italy, Lithuania, Macedonia, Malta, Romania, Slovenia, Spain, Turkey, UK. This training course was aimed at youth workers in order to equip them with the necessary knowledge, understanding and skills to be able to ensure the inclusion of young people who are underrepresented and from backgrounds of fewer opportunities.

3.11 – E+ Youth Exchange: A Race for Tolerancy. A Youth Exchange about bringing it out

During November, another project took place whereby four participants participated on behalf of MU YA. The project “Race for Tolerance” revolved around tolerance as being promoted as an intrinsic ideology. This YE focussed on proving that tolerance is one of the most important pillars for long-lasting peace and key at improving the society of tomorrow’s worlds. For anyone who wants to know more, we could say –google it! ... but through this YE, participants were prompted to say ... –Explain it to others! –YOU, bring tolerance to the people. During this project, 40 participants from Germany, Bulgaria, Czech Republic, France, Hungary, Romania, Malta and the UK learnt to develop and teach each other methods on how to create tolerance in the immediate community. The scope culminated through a Tolerance Race that was organized out on the road for the people of the village.

3.12 – E+ Training Course: Youth Exchange Leadership Skills (Y.E.L.S)

Maltese delegates participated in the Training Course titled "Youth Exchange Leadership Skills (Y.E.L.S)" which took place in Pragelato, Italy. Group leaders working with youths gathered from 7 countries Malta, UK, Sweden, Italy, Latvia, Greece and Romania to take part in a project which dealt with the topic of leadership. The aim of the project was to create a long term, substantial educational experience for YE group leaders towards the maximization of learning and minimization of risk for young leaders of the future. Through these experience, recognition of their role as learning facilitators/educators was increased. In Christian’s words “during the training course we got to discuss and gather helpful tools relating to youth exchange leadership. Amongst the topics were; identifying the qualities of the ideal leader and how to work on obtaining them, how to prepare a group of teens for the exchange, how to deal with challenging or uncomfortable issues, and how to motivate your group and help in their integration with other participants”. As detailed in section 5.1, this project will be followed by two subsequent projects organised by the same host organization – an APV in May 2019 and a Youth Exchange on the topic of Migration and Solidarity in June – July 2019.

3.13 – E+ Youth Exchange APV: Humanity on the Road

Organised by Stowarzyszenie Europe4Youth

Krakow, Poland, 25th January – 28th January 2019

Maltese participants: Rebecca Saliba, Jenny Zammit

The second project for 2019 took place in Poland between youths aged between 18 – 24. There were other participants from Italy, Germany and Poland. During the APV, the participants prepared the workshops for the weeks of May and September 2019. The methodology employed to come up with these workshops was LARP (live action role play). In the words of Rebecca and Jenny, it was planned that during the first two days of the YE the group set up and introduced the method set up. A scenario to be created and each participant will adopt a role. In the activities plan, a day will be dedicated to visit Krakow. Everyday team building and debriefing sessions will be organized with all the participants. Ms. Zammit said that the organisers are familiar with the method and very enthusiastic. The workshops took place in a small village 1 hour outside Krakow, where the food and accommodation were adequately available.

4. Other Meetings & Collaborations

4.1 – Meeting with the Maltese National Commission of UNESCO

18th April 2018

The Maltese National Commission of UNESCO was invited for a meeting with President Ms Rodianne Cassar and Secretary General Thelma Bonello. The meeting took place in April at the premises of the Commission in Pembroke. On the behalf of the Commission, Chairman Dr Ray Bonding and Executive Secretary Mr Phillip Cassar were present. The meeting served to introduce both committees and provide an explanation of the organizational structure, to briefly describe MUYA's and the Commission's functions and activities and then focused on possible future collaboration. Both parties agreed that it is of vital importance that after this first meeting a good communication is installed. Both Dr. Bondin and Mr. Cassar emphasized multiple times about the importance they are willing to give to the Youth branch as per UNESCO recommendations. To date, MUYA has invited the Commission to all events being held by the association and the Commission has sent multiple invitations to MUYA such as an invitation to attend the "2nd World Cultural Heritage Youth Symposium" being held in April 2019 in Athens – Ancient Olympia on which two committee members are participating on behalf of MUYA and the Commission (see section 5.1).

4.2 – Information Meeting - Beneficial Owners: How will they affect VOs?

24th October 2018

During October, the Malta Council for the Voluntary Sector and the Registrar for Legal Persons at Identity Malta organized a session to explain the EU Directive 849/2015 of the European Parliament. This EU directive revolves around the prevention of the use of the financial system for the purposes of money laundering or terrorist financing. Since October, NGOs in Malta are required to register to assess administrators of the NGO. Following the session, MUYA submitted all documents required to be in line with this new directive effecting NGOs.



5. Upcoming Projects and Events

5.1 – Future Participation in International projects abroad

MUYA is currently working on participating in a number of international projects abroad that are now accepted and will actualize in the coming year. A total of 9 separate events are already approved which is already the normal quota for a given year of approved international projects indicating that such projects are becoming more popular amongst the youth increasing the momentum of participation.

Amongst these approved projects are the second and third segments of **“Wings of youth work”** organised by Mladinski center Trbovli in Slovenia between 4th March – 8th March and the 21st May – 23rd May; **“Youth Exchange Leadership Skills (Y.E.L.S)”** organised by Madiba and will take place in Italy between the 21st June to the 1st July 2019 and preceded by an Advanced Planning Visit in May 2019; **“Update to transnational”** organised by The other Europe in Granada, Spain between the 21st February to the 28th February and the 1st March to the 8th March 2019; **“Humanities Hand”** organised by Love Life Generation in the UK between 8th April – 14th April 2019; **“Visual Dreamers”** organized by Shokkin Group Italia in Italy between the 13th April – 20th April 2019; **“Make it Rural”** organized by Active Youth in Lithuania between the 24th April to the 30th April; and **“You got talent”** organized by SAL FUERA ELX also in the upcoming months.

Between 10th April – 14th April 2019, Committee Members Rodianne Cassar and Reece Delia will be attending the **“2nd World Cultural Heritage Youth Symposium”** in Athens – Ancient Olympia Greece whereby a resolution that will be ultimately presented to UNESCO will be drafted, officialised and signed by all members.

5.2 – Pending applications

MUYA has submitted two project applications to the Maltese National Agency, EUPA which are i) an Erasmus+ Training Course named **“LEAD – Leadership Exploration and Development”** which is based on the participation of 29 youth workers from 8 different countries and ii) an Erasmus+ Youth Exchange named **“Creativity Malta – Equality through Cultural Awareness and Acceptance”** which envisions the participation of 35 youths from 5 different countries. In both cases, the projects are requesting an EU grant of around 20,000 €+. The decision of the Maltese National Agency on funding will be announced in the coming months. In that case, the project(s) will be implemented throughout the duration of a whole week in September and in November 2019 respectively.

MUYA has also submitted **“SIMFONIJA – Uniting People and Cultures through the Power of music”** through the Creative Communities Fund available from the Malta Arts Council for 2019 which if granted, will see the creation of monthly orchestral sessions over a span of 9 months which will culminate in a concert is created by passionate musicians from all across Malta and beyond for the general public.
