



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Introduction

MUYA's fourth committee was elected on the 29th of April, 2010.


In its fourth year, the committee met eighteen times and organised two local events for its members and the public.

The Association has participated in ten international projects with 19 opportunities for youth to travel for these events.

The Association participated in the setting up of the international roaming Anne Frank Exhibition in Valletta. MUYA assisted in this project not only in the physical set up of the exhibition but also provided human resources for the daily running of the event. MUYA has also been active for the second year in successfully promoting the Crocus Project in Malta, where a record number of schools took part.

During the past year, the MUYA Committee continued its work in ensuring that the outcome of the Training Course Rightly Yours Rightly Mine, organised in 2009 produced its fruits – a book on Human Rights for children. In fact, during the whole year, various activities were held with regard to its publication, text, illustrations and many other things.

The Committee augurs that by the end of summer 2011, the book would not only be printed, but ready to be distributed to all the schools on the Islands.

Grundtvig Workshop: Migrants Unused Potentials


15 participants from 7 different countries (Romania, Italy, Spain, Finland, Poland, Cyprus, Malta) took part in the 5-day workshop „Migrants´ Unused Potentials“, from 05/10/2010 to 05/16/2010. The participants had various individual backgrounds, some of them were already engaged in the field of further education and integration of migrants, others were interested in the topic for other reasons, e. g. out of personal or academic interest.

The main focus of the workshop was on the presentation of the situation of migrants in the Federal Republic of Germany, with emphasis on their specific needs and the possibilities to get them involved in the process of integration, as well as the activities of NGOs, networks and self-organisations.

By visiting different organisations who work primarily with migrants, the participants were provided an insight into the situation through practical examples, especially by the IBZ - Intercultural Meeting Centre in Bielefeld and the Liborianum, Education centre of the archdiocese Paderborn.

Discussions were held on the given topic such as the current situation of migration and integration in Germany, by giving an introduction of a social scientific study with the topic migration/integration. Furthermore the chances and problems of integration were discussed with the main focus on art, culture and sports.

Another important point of the workshop was the international exchange of experiences: The migration situation in the individual countries was extensively presented by the respective participants. It became clear that the different countries are facing vastly different problems – in this context, lively discussions and exchanges of opinions took place, and certainly the participants brought some new ideas home.



YiA Training Course: Immigrant Youth - Help 2 Include

This training course was dedicated to 26 youth workers and NGO representatives who primarily work with young people from a non-EU immigration background at local level in the European Union. The purpose was to enhance the skills and knowledge of multipliers on how to use creative methods in the context of active participation and European Citizenship.


The EU has been developing an increasing number of policy initiatives in the field of immigration and integration. Nevertheless various polls show that young people with a non-EU immigration biography often feel personally not being involved in this process due to various reasons, be it social, political or simply personal. This results in formation of parallel societies followed by social exclusion. In such a social hierarchy those young people are the first who lose the global game and fall deeper into hopelessness.

How is it possible to increase the level of interest among young people with a non-EU immigration biography on what happens around them; in their local society as well as in Europe? How to empower those young people becoming responsible European citizens and to actively contribute to civic life in their local societies?

This training course had an innovative and creative approach. It was planned to show and develop ways and enhance the skills of youth workers on how to attract young people's awareness about European issues as something which facilitates and doesn't force integration through methods such as theatre and music.

The objectives of this Training course were:

- Exploring and understanding Europe and European values as a challenge for young people with a non-EU biography;
- Fostering greater understanding on immigration and identity in European context;
- Highlighting the sense of personal responsibility and sensitivity as youth workers in this context;
- Raising inner awareness on citizenship (rights and responsibilities);
- Providing skills and tools to work on citizenship by using creative methods with youngsters;
- Promoting YOUTH IN ACTION programme as tools for future cooperation among youth NGOs in this field;
- Contact making among youth workers / NGOs in order to create a basis for future action 1 (youth exchange) projects.



**Grundtvig Workshop:
Learning Democracy – New Methods of Integration**

15 participants from 8 different countries (Portugal, Italy, Malta, Poland, Romania, Turkey, Cyprus, Greece) took part in the 5-day workshop „Learning Democracy – New Methods for Integration” from June 21st till 27th, 2010.


The participants had various individual backgrounds, some of them were already engaged in the field of further education and integration of migrants, others were interested in the topic for other reasons, e. g. out of personal or academic interest.

The main focus of the workshop was on communicating innovative best practice methods (all of them tested during a Grundtvig Learning partnership) in adult education with the target group being migrants and minorities.

In particular, the following methods were used: 1. The Oerlinghausen Meditation Path – the way of thought-provoking impulses, 2. Memory boxes – a biographical coming-to-terms with one's own life experiences, 3. Encounters with the German history through excursions.

The situation of migrants in Germany with their specific needs and the possibilities to get them involved in the integration process was also a key topic, comparisons to the situation in the other countries were made.

Different organisations that work primarily with migrants were visited to provide the participants with the possibility to get first-hand informations about migration work in Germany such as the migrants NGO "Monolith" with a presentation of their educational offer for adults and young migrants from former Sovjet Union.



The project “1st International Youth Meeting: European Citizen – Where are you?” in Heiligenstadt/Thuringia, from 1st to 7th August 2010 invited 43 juveniles and actives in the domain of youth work from several European countries, to set a platform for debating the essential topics of European citizenship and youth participation, exchanging experiences, and additionally learn more of non-formal methods, which could be made use of in future youth projects.

For this purpose CULTURE GOES EUROPE (CGE) – Soziokulturelle Initiative Erfurt e.V. organised several activities at different „floors“, so that the conference’s participants got the option of choosing out of the programme. Each project day was like a cluster with a special theme; from democracy to media. But these clusters had ever been connected to the project’s topics: youth participation, European citizenship, plus non-formal learning.

Within the framework of the project there had been an excursion to Erfurt on August 5th, 2010. Following several workshops on topics like website/blog, graphics, and design etc., Plattform e.V. of Erfurt invited for a visitation of the “Projekt Ladebalken” (project “progress bar”) and for discussing the topics “youth participation at local level and the role of media”.

During the sessions discussions on migration, democracy and active citizenship were held. All of these topics were divided into groups with participants choosing their favourite topic such as migration - quite a hot topic for Maltese - and the benefits from migration. Another topic which was discussed during one activity was the future of e-democracy.




**Grundtvig Workshop:

The Grundtvig Workshop 'Information is a first step for participation' took place from 21.2. to 25.2 2011 in Krzyzowa, Poland and consisted of: active workshops, that provide the knowledge for participants and that are based on their every day life experience regarding issue of getting public information, being informed, engagement into social activities broadly understood participation.

Through Lectures, discussions, brain storms, group work, cultural and group integrating activities, the topic of the workshop was worked on and in the middle of the workshop a meeting with local public officials made a special, interactive impression on the participants.

The Participants had plenty of opportunities for sharing their experiences in a way that is accessible for everyone and at the same time that implements some newest pedagogical techniques – like specially designed thematic games.

Drama Tools for Intercultural Dialogue and Active Participation

The training course was held in Buzau, Romania, between the 5th and the 12th May, 2011 on tools using drama in various youth projects to develop intercultural dialogue and active participation.


37 youth workers, youngsters, project managers, NGO members and project coordinators from 24 countries, who wanted to learn about practical skills and tools on how to use drama in daily work with youngsters to promote intercultural dialogue and active participation met at this TC to work on the given topic.

Aims where:

- To provide participants new competences and tools through nonformal education methods connected with improvisation, verbal and nonverbal communication, forum theater etc.
- To increase cooperation between organization from Europe in the frame of Youth in Action program for future projects especially between program countries and EECA and SEE
- To create a more sensitive way to aware people on the role of drama to solve social problems in community
- To offer a common space for 37 participants from 28 organization from 24 countries to reflect on European citizenship, intercultural dialogue and active participation.

Activities included:

- Ice breaking games, socializing, role plays
- Workshops: communication, improvisation, drama, forum-theater
- Cultural visits in Buzau and surroundings
- Intercultural evenings and Romanian traditional night
- A final show of forum-theater



Local activities

Crocus Project

Malta/Gozo

September 2010 – March 2011

The Crocus Project is intended for pupils aged eleven years and upwards. The project is now a perennial activity with schools from all over the world becoming involved in it every year.


Holocaust Education Trust Ireland usually provides schools with yellow crocus bulbs to plant in autumn in memory of one and a half million Jewish children and thousands of other children who died in the Holocaust. This year like last year, in Malta, through the Malta UNESCO Youth Association, the organisation provided the schools not with yellow crocus bulbs, but with yellow daffodil bulbs due to the fact that crocus plants do not survive in Malta. The yellow flowers recall the yellow Stars of David that Jews were forced to wear under Nazi rule. The daffodils bloom around March and when people admire the flowers, the children can explain what they represent. The international Holocaust Memorial Day is on the 27th of January, which we encourage the schools to remember.

The Crocus Project is a tangible way to introduce young people to the subject of the Holocaust and to raise awareness about the dangers of racism, discrimination, prejudice and bigotry. The Trust makes available guidelines and information which may be of assistance to teachers during this activity. These resources complement existing material on integration and acceptance. The children's involvement in planting the bulbs and watching the flowers grow encourages ongoing learning about the importance of tolerance and respect.

The Trust has also launched the Online Crocus Club, a secure online forum (www.hetireland.org/crocus) where participating schools can share their experiences of The Crocus Project and make new friends. There are separate forums for teachers and students and it is administered by the Trust. We hope that all schools and students will become active members of the Online Crocus Club.

The project is in its 2nd year in Malta and has been a very successful activity in the scholastic year 2009 - 2010. This year apart from the Malta UNESCO Youth Association, The Scout Group of Malta is promoting the project within several scout groups on the island. In the end 6 Scout Groups took part actively.

MUYA, with the help of the Education Division identified 20 schools that were interested in participating in this project and distributed hundreds of bulbs to all the children.



We invited the schools to propose a focal point within the school, be it a form teacher, history teacher, geography teacher or any other teacher deemed fit to be responsible for the project within the school, with one (1) class of not more than thirty (30) students.

The participating schools were asked to send the teacher responsible to an information session whereby details about the project will be announced and guidelines and information packs will be distributed.

The following activities were held:

- 9th November, 2010 - Information for Link Teachers held at the Education Department, Floriana
- 15th November, 2010 - Crocus Bulbs distributed to Schools in Malta
- 20th November, 2010 - Malta UNESCO Youth Association, Philip Caruana & Sarah Suda, went to Gozo College, Xewkija Primary on a courtesy visit regarding the Crocus Project
- 22nd November, 2010 - Information Session for Scout Leaders at the Scout Header Quarters in Floriana

On 16th December, 2010 a new website - www.heticrocusprojectmalta.org - has been launched that gives all the information about the HETI Crocus Project in Malta with the kind permission of the Holocaust Education Trust Ireland.

On 21st March, 2011 MUYA organised a press conference where it presented the outcomes of the project. The event included short speeches by the children regarding their experience of the Crocus project.

17th October, 2010



Exhibition: Anne Frank – A History for Today
Auberge De Castille, Valletta
December 2010 – February 2011


Malta UNESCO Youth Association collaborated with the Office of the Prime Minister and Karl Borg Events in the exhibition “Anne Frank – A History for Today”, that took place at the Auberge De Castille from 28th January until 18th February 2011.

Acknowledging the importance of the message of the Anne Frank exhibition, the organisation has worked closely with Karl Borg Events and the Office of the Prime Minister throughout the set-up of the exhibition and helped out also throughout, until the exhibition came to a close.

During the launch of the exhibition, thanks to Karl Borg Events, the Malta UNESCO Youth Association presented the Prime Minister Dr Lawrence Gonzi, with a memento, a yellow narcissus made out of glass that, like in The Crocus Project, represents the millions of children that died in the holocaust. The star shaped flower recalls the yellow star of David that Jews were forced to wear during the Nazi regime.

The travelling exhibition, Anne Frank – A History for Today, told the story of Anne Frank set against the background of the Holocaust. The exhibition made use of images from the Frank family photo albums and quotations from the diary of Anne Frank. Each panel displayed information about the most important developments of that time; the rise of National Socialism, the Second World War and the persecution of the Jews.

The exhibition was in both, Maltese and English, and was free of charge. The Anne Frank exhibition has been supported by the German, Dutch and the United States of America Embassies.

Suspension of funds - letter

Throughout the past year MUYA participated fully in the activities organised by KNZ. This year was unfortunately characterised by the suspension of the Youth in Action and Life Long Learning Funds and therefore the main focus of the National Youth Council was the reinstatement of these funds. MUYA as a full member of KNZ, contributed in formulating a letter addressed to the European Commission pointing out the negative effects of the suspension of these programmes on students, young people and the general public and asking to re-activated them as soon as possible.

Organisations Committee


MUYA participated in all the Organisations Committees or Kumitat tal-Ghaqdiet organised by KNZ. This is an important organ within KNZ as it proposes recommendations to the Executive Committee.

KNZ Executive Committee

Anson Aquilina was the first MUYA member to be elected to the KNZ Executive Committee during the AGA in March 2010. We thank Anson for his work and although he could not hold his post for a whole term, we still appreciate his effort and contribution in promoting the cause of Maltese youth in Malta and abroad. During the 2011 KNZ AGA, Sarah Suda contested the elections, and even though she was not elected, on behalf of the members and the committee of MUYA we still want to show our appreciation towards her will of representing us on such an important body. As an NGO that works with and for young people, we definitely encourage our members to seriously consider contesting in such elections, not only as ambassadors of MUYA but also as contributors in meliorating the quality of life of fellow young Maltese citizens.

Sub-committee on Youth and Sexual Health

During the month of June 2010, KNZ set up a sub-committee on Youth and Sexual Health with a view of discussing Maltese Youth and Sexual Health issues, the position that KNZ should adopt on such issues, new proposals that KNZ should include in its Social Policy objectives and suggestions on how these proposals should be implemented. MUYA was represented on this sub-committee by Ms Joanna Bonnici where she gave a thorough scientific explanation on the importance of educating young people on sexual behaviour and sexually transmitted diseases, the importance of contraception and above all to ensure that such topics are not considered as taboo issues.



International Cooperation

FLARE Network

FLARE is a network of civil society organisations committed to struggle against transnational organised crime. Founded in 2008, it is composed of more than 40 NGOs from 30 countries across Europe, the Mediterranean basin, the Russian Federation, the Caucasus and the Balkans. On 19th January 2010 the FLARE Network's annual assembly elected MUYA anonymously to become full member of the platform.

FLARE's work is focused on informing civil society about topics such as human trafficking, drug trafficking, corruption and information, eco-crimes, money laundering, illegal weapons trade and energy policies. It also intends to support those people who have fallen victims of international organised crime by getting in touch with their families. Youngsters too are a very important target group and tool for our activities as we believe the fight against organised crime begins with raising awareness among our young generations. Additionally, it intends to make pressure onto European Union institutions for implementing a model for countering transnational organised crime that entails the confiscation and the re-use for social purposes of criminal assets.

The FLARE Network is able to set in motion people from over thirty countries through the efforts of our network, which represents an outstanding tool to give to the civil society a leading role in the fight against transnational organised crime.

On behalf of MUYA, Dorianne Formosa attended the first international forum on transnational organised crime, illegal economies and globalisation "OLE - Otranto Legality Experience" from 29th August until 3rd September. The forum has been attended to by 200 people from all over the world who had the chance to follow seminars led by Italian and international experts on the topics of the forum.

From 8th until 10th December Dorianne Formosa attended the OC, corruption and human rights: Conference at the EU Parliament at Brussels. This consisted of the conference "Corruption organised crime, and illegal economies a serious challenge in the EU: confiscation and social reuse as a European countermeasure" and the seminar "Voices of human rights defenders".



iloveculture.eu


iloveculture.eu is an online-portal aimed at promoting international youth projects. It is meant as a platform for organisations to make their international youth projects visible through videos and photos and a platform for young people to engage themselves more and more in the world of intercultural dialogue. The main focus is on projects developed within the frame-work of the European Youth Foundation (Council of Europe) and the Youth in Action programme (European Commission).

This website has several functions for organisations as well as for participants in international projects:

- Organisations can open a profile, add an online portfolio, upload information for participant who participate in a specific project (closed community), announce projects/events, share results and search for partner organisations.
- Single participants can make an own profile, find projects to participate in, seek opportunities, rate projects they have been participating in, communicate with other participants and search for partner organisations.

Unfortunately the third part of the project, which had to consist of a seminar in Nijmegen in the Netherlands with the aim of teaching the participants how to develop their own international youth projects, had to be cancelled due to the ash cloud produced by the volcano in Iceland. The project was meant to be held between 19th and 26th April, 2010.

It was postponed to 18th till 25th October, 2010 where participants worked on several projects and the partnership between the various organisations was deepened. Dorianne Formosa attended on behalf of MUYA together with 4 other Maltese participants mainly from TDM2000 Malta.



International Projects

Children's Book on Human Rights

The Project run by the Malta UNESCO Youth Association and funded by the European Youth Fund of the Council of Europe takes the Universal Declaration on Human Rights and re-writes it in child friendly language. Partner groups of MUYA in this project are the Estonian UNESCO Youth Association, the Youth Center of Dravinya Valley (Slovenia) and Initiative Regional Youth Council (Bulgaria).

The Children's book on Human Rights will present the 30 Articles in the Universal Declaration on Human Rights through a story 'lived' by a main cartoon character, called Yuko. Colourful illustrations and simplified text should make it more interesting and eye-catching for 7 - 9 year olds - which is the target audience of this book.

It is envisaged that 1500 books will be printed and disseminated in schools in Malta, Estonia, Bulgaria & Slovenia. With the help of further funding and collaboration we hope to take the project on the next level with distribution all over Europe.


On 30th July, 2010 an online-forum was launched to connect the partner groups, to discuss the progress of the project and to keep participants involved and interested "outsiders" up-to-date with the *status quo* of the book (<http://rosaleen.forumotion.eu>).

On 20th and 21st November, 2010 a Creative Session among the Maltese group was held in Gozo. A lot of ideas were generated on characterisation during the one day workshop. The results of this workshop were put together to create the final character.

Background information about the project is disseminated through the project's new website <http://www.childrensbookonhumanrights.org>, launched on 30th November, 2010.

On 3rd January, 2011, following the creative session in Gozo in November, the story line of the book was finalised. The next step was to work on each of the individual articles.

From 1st to 3rd April, 2011 the creative session with our international partners was held in Valletta. The results have been very fruitful and the first draft of the story was sent to the illustrator for a first visualization, which arrived on the 9th of May.



European Voluntary Service


August 1st, 2010 - May 31st, 2011

During the last quarter of 2008, Malta UNESCO Youth Association was accredited as an EVS Sending Organisation within the Youth in Action Programme. An EVS Sending Organisation promotes the European Voluntary Service and acts as the body that coordinates the sending of Maltese volunteers on the European Voluntary Service experience - which can be a 3, 6 or 12 month experience in voluntary work in a European or third country.

On the MUYA ticket, Aneta Toteva from Bulgaria became the first EVS participant, when she signed an agreement with the NGO United Societies of Balkans from Thessaloniki, Greece.

United Societies of Balkans is a Non Governmental Organization with the aim to promote the intercultural dialogue among Balkan countries and East Europe. USB also supports minorities and immigrants and promote human rights.

Aneta worked and still works on several projects of USB such as Thess - Diktio, Balkan Streets Festival, Ignoring the past is condemning the future etc. Her EVS started on 1st August 2010 and will end on 31st May, 2010.



Recognition

MUYA's President receives TOYP Award

Malta UNESCO Youth Association's President, Sarah Suda, got awarded the TOYP (The Outstanding Young Person) award for the category *contribution to children, world peace, and /or human rights* for her work done with MUYA during the TOYP awards ceremony that was held at The Hilton Hotel, Malta on 28th November, 2010.

The award is aimed at giving deserved recognition, on a national as well as on an international level, to any individual who has made a difference in his or her community and beyond.

Launched locally in 2004, the TOYP Award has given recognition to a number of individuals within various fields. Young people such as Dr Simon Busuttil, Ms Marija Schranz, Ms Sylvana Brannon, Hon Dr Tonio Fenech and Eng Dr Nicholas Sammut have all been winners of previous TOYP Awards. In 2009, Dr Alan Deidun won the TOYP Award as well.

Young men and women between the age of 18 and 40 get nominated for 10 different categories and from the winners of each category The Outstanding Young Person of the Year is selected. David Serge (filmmaker and business person - The Bigger Picture) won the overall award. The TOYP awards are organised in Malta by Junior Chamber International Malta.

Enrolment with the Commissioner for Voluntary Organisations

The Office of the Commissioner for Voluntary Organisations was set up by the Voluntary Organisations Act 2007 with the task to strengthen the voluntary sector through various initiatives with the specific aim of promoting the work of Voluntary Organisations as well as encouraging their role as partners with the Government in various initiatives. Cap. 23 of 2007 Voluntary Organisations Act came into force in November 2007 with the appointment of the first Commissioner for Voluntary Organisations (CVO) Prof. Kenneth Wain.

The ultimate mission of the Commissioner's office is to give more visibility to the voluntary sector as well as to guarantee transparency and accountability of the organisations that compose it in the carrying out of their important work. In view of this, the Office of the Commissioner is also the regulatory authority responsible for this sector with the aim of monitoring and supervising the activities of these organisations as well as supporting them.

MUYA sent the application form in September 2010 and received the official certificate on 30th March, 2011.
